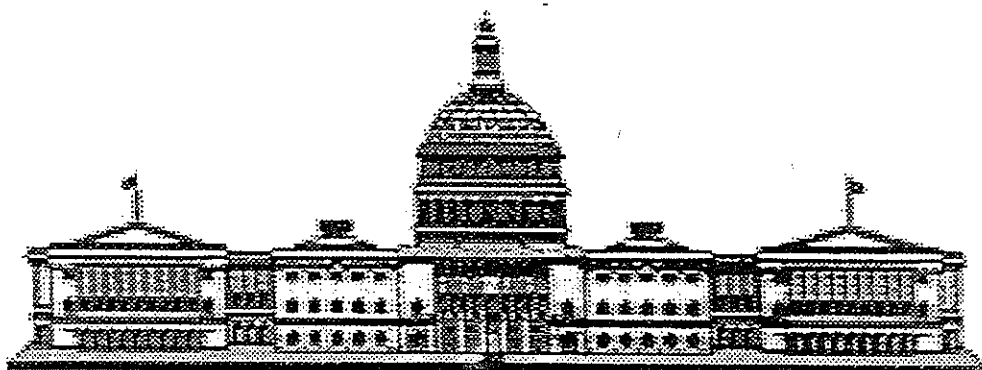

## About the Environmental Voting Record and the IEC

The *Environmental Voting Record* is published by the Illinois Environmental Council (IEC) for purposes of public education and information. It provides a record and analysis of votes in the Illinois General Assembly on a wide range of environmental and conservation bills to help create better-informed citizens in the state of Illinois. The IEC is the only Illinois environmental organization working full-time to educate citizens about the legislative process and voting records of the members of the Illinois General Assembly.

This edition of the *Environmental Voting Record* provides objective, factual information about the environmental voting records of all members of the 90th Illinois General Assembly. The votes included in this *Record* presented members of the General Assembly with a real choice on protecting the environment. Except in rare circumstances, the *Record* excludes consensus action on bills.

No endorsement of any party, legislator or political candidate is implied in this *Record* or in other publications and activities of the Illinois Environmental Council. The IEC does not make financial contributions to, nor receive them from, any political party.

The Illinois Environmental Council is a not-for-profit coalition of individuals and organizations committed to a healthful environment, stewardship of natural resources, and public participation in the decision-making processes of the state. Founded in 1975, the IEC currently includes more than seventy affiliated organizations. Governed by a statewide board of directors, the IEC serves its membership through its advocacy on state issues, informative publications, and networking assistance.

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## Introduction

The IEC has selected bills from both the 1997 and 1998 sessions of the 90th General Assembly for the *Environmental Voting Record*. The bills represent a wide range of IEC concerns involving the general areas of pollution prevention, waste reduction, maintenance of biodiversity, and a healthful environment for Illinois communities.

A brief description of all bills used for this *Record* can be found on pages 3 through 5. Roll calls for the Senate appear on pages 6 and 7; for the Illinois House on pages 8 through 11. Percentages have been calculated for each legislator. The *Environmental Voting Record* also gives the 1996 percentage for legislators who were in office at the time.

The overall profile shows a range of 1998 percentage scores from 0% to 100% for both the Illinois Senate and House. In the Senate the average of all scores was 51%, with Democrats scoring an average 70% and Republicans scoring an average 34%. In the House, the average of all scores was 49%, with Democrats scoring an average 56% and Republicans scoring an average 40%.

## SENATE BILLS

### ENVIRONMENTAL EDUCATION

#### SB65: Minority Scholarships

Sponsors: Senators Trotter-Hendon



Pro-environmental Vote: Yes

This bill amended the Higher Education Student Assistance Act in order to create a minority environmental scholarship program for students pursuing undergraduate or graduate degrees in any environmentally related field.

### AIR QUALITY

#### SB819: Air Pollution Operating Permits

Representative Novak

Pro-environmental Vote: No

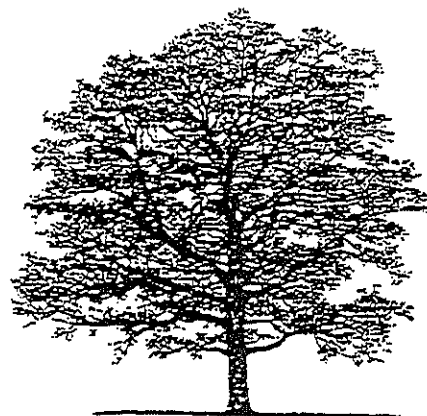
This bill exempted medium sized sources of air pollution from the requirement to renew operating permits. It authorizes the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency to issue lifetime permits for these air pollution sources.

#### SB1103: Leaf Burning

Sponsors: Senators Severns-Trotter-Farley  
Representatives Novak-A. Moore

Pro-environmental Vote: Yes

This bill prohibited leaf burning in municipalities with a population over 75,000. The legislation would have applied to ten municipalities including Arlington Heights, Aurora, Chicago, Decatur, Elgin, Joliet, Naperville, Peoria, Rockford, and Springfield. It passed both the Senate and House but was subsequently vetoed by the Governor. The final Senate vote (29-22-6) failed to override the Governor's veto.

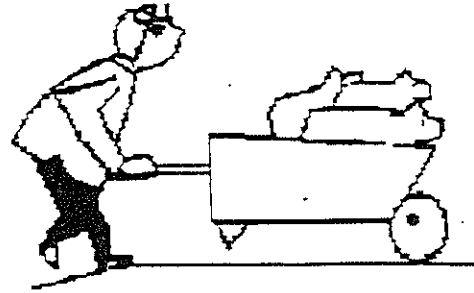


## AGRICULTURE

### SB1707: Livestock Mega-Facilities

Representatives M. Smith-Moffitt-Leitch-Slone

Pro-environmental Vote: No for-the Senate version  
Yes for the House version



This bill, passed unanimously out of the Senate, contained language supported by industry groups to amend the Livestock Management Facilities Act. The bill was amended in the House (eliminating the Senate's livestock language) to include "Peoria Six" language regarding livestock mega-facilities. This amendment addressed construction standards for waste handling facilities other than lagoons; established public information meetings; provided for inspection of waste handling facilities servicing 500 or more animal units; lowered the animal unit thresholds for waste management plans; allowed for use of phosphorus, nitrogen, or potassium rates for waste management plans; and, prohibited construction of facilities with 500 or more animal units in flood plains, areas with karst topography, and certain locations with a high water table.

## HOUSE BILLS

### WASTE REDUCTION

#### HB94: Secondary Materials Market

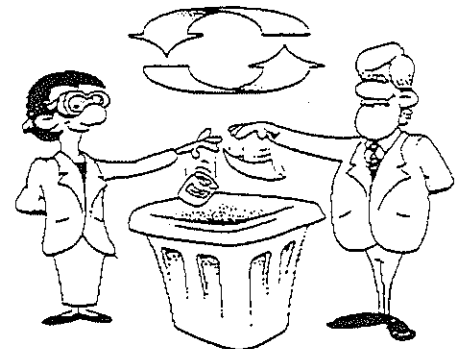
This bill amended the Solid Waste Management Act and created a 2-year pilot program to provide funding for the recycling industry's secondary materials market. The Senate amended the bill extending deadlines for creation of the program and requiring that the strategic plan suggest methods of encouraging the public to purchase and use products made from secondary materials. The bill passed unanimously out of the Senate.

#### HB823: Unbleached Paper

Pro-environmental Vote: Yes

This bill amended the Paper Purchasing Act to require CMS to give price preferences to vendors of unbleached and non-chlorine bleached paper in the procurement of printing paper, stationery, and envelopes.



**AIR QUALITY**

**HB470: Open Burning Landscape Waste**

Pro-environmental Vote: Yes

This bill required the Pollution Control Board to adopt rules prohibiting the open burning of landscape waste in areas of the state classified as moderate, serious, severe, or extreme non-attainment areas.

**HB1309: Solid Waste Energy Facilities**

Pro-environmental Vote: No

This bill would have reestablished the Retail Rate Law for two incinerators, Robbins and Ford Heights. The Retail Rate Law, repealed in 1996, provided tax breaks and other incentives for incinerator owners and developers.

**HB3129: Kyoto Protocol Act**

Pro-environmental Vote: No

This legislation prevents the IEPA and IPCB from proposing or adopting any new rule intended to reduce emissions of greenhouse gases. Neither can they submit any legally enforceable commitments related to the reduction of greenhouse gases to the USEPA or any other agency of the federal government without an Act from the Illinois General Assembly. It allows for on-going voluntary initiatives only.

**HJR36: Kyoto Protocol U.S. Commitments**

Pro-environmental Vote: No

This resolution urges the President of the United States to avoid entering into treaty commitments imposing emission reductions that would negatively impact the U.S. economy, without imposing similar limitations on developing nations.

**HJR48: Kyoto Protocol President**

Senators Leuchtefeld-Lauzen

Pro-environmental Vote: No

Urges the President of the United States not to sign the Kyoto Protocol.

**Explanation of Ratings**

- P Legislator voted "present" to avoid a possible conflict of interest.
- E Legislator had an "excused" absence during the vote. Excused absences are not included in calculating the EVR percentages.

- NA Indicates that the individual was not in office at the time of the vote.
